Analysis of Burgundy's most desirable wines in the context of the 2016 *en primeur* campaign

January 2018

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Just in time for the 2016 *en primeur* season, we are delighted to publish the fourth regional study from Wine Lister, this time looking at Burgundy. Here, for the first time, we have decided to take a closer look at this hallowed old-world region – the darling of fine wine collectors worldwide. Burgundy is the hottest property in fine wine terms, and showing no signs of cooling down any time soon. With some big name domaines changing hands recently, it's not only the value of the land that's on the up: prices, popularity, and demand are all escalating.

In this report, we have looked in detail at 175 of the most desirable Burgundy labels from right across the Côte d'Or (see full list). Once again, we have drawn upon the unique combination of data at our disposal thanks to Wine Lister's official partnerships with the world's leading fine wine authorities (now including Jeannie Cho Lee MW), as well as ground-breaking proprietary research.

To complement this wealth of data, we have canvassed the opinion of Wine Lister's Founding Members – the world's leading fine wine trade players, between them with revenues representing more than one third of the global fine wine trade. We asked these experts to share their observations on trends in Burgundy, adding a qualitative layer to our otherwise quantitative, objective approach.

- First we put Burgundy into a global context, looking at its positioning compared to other fine wine regions in terms of price performance, popularity, trading volumes and average scores
- We also delve deeper into Burgundy itself, analysing the performance of different subsets and recent vintages
- Next we use Wine Lister's proprietary rating algorithms to gain a 360° perspective on the performance of Burgundy's top wines across Wine Lister's three primary rating categories: Quality, Brand, and Economics
- We take each of Wine Lister's rating criteria in isolation to produce in-depth comparative tables and analyses of the different wines' performance
- Lastly, we present the highlights of our in-depth survey of the fine wine trade as they relate to Burgundy and the 175 wines in this study

Our analysis confirms Burgundy's prowess across many areas, from unstoppable price increases to surging popularity, not to mention Burgundy's top cuvées enjoying the highest Wine Lister scores of those from any major fine wine region. Certain domaines predictably dominate the score charts, while we also note the surprising absence of some of the big négociants' top wines from the upper echelons.

Meanwhile the trade identifies a few clear trends in the region, including a new generation of winemakers opting for more purity of style, and heightened interest in less renowned appellations, even as the top names continue to dominate overall.

We hope you enjoy reading this study, whether you are yourself Burgundian, or simply one of the wine world's many Burgundy fanatics.

Market overview

– taking Burgundy's temperature

Burgundy's mercury just keeps on rising, and all indications point skywards.

Unprecedented repeat frost and hail damage has amplified Burgundy's already unique supply and demand dynamic. Five straight years of shortage of stock has increased demand and escalated prices. A similar phenomenon was seen in 1978 with small quantities after the weak year of '77, but with fewer growers bottling their own wine, and the Asian market not yet on the scene, price inflation was far less rampant.

In recent years Burgundy's prices have gone up more quickly than those in any other major wine region. While the region still can't match Bordeaux in terms of liquidity and popularity at the cuvée level, a comparison of producers overall shows it is not far behind. What is more, Burgundy is gaining in popularity at a much faster rate than its south-westerly neighbour, and only Piedmont is growing more quickly.

Burgundy's Wine Lister scores are strong across the board, leading other wine regions in the Quality category and by a huge margin in the Economics category. Its Brand scores are its weakest, due to the comparably small production of each wine, but still trumping other wine regions apart from Bordeaux (where Brand is king).


While quantities are again reduced for the 2016 vintage being tasted this month *en primeur*, in 2017, for the first time since 2011, the harvest was generous (at least for the reds). This might begin in due course to reduce some of the pressure on supply, although with demand as strong as it is, there's no reason for prices to drop accordingly. The annual Hospices de Beaune sale serves as both a marketing tool and a health check for the whole region. If the 2017 auction was anything to go by, then prices will keep on rising: it brought in its highest total ever, and the average price per barrel was up 20% on 2016 (though 12% down on 2015).



Six-year price performance by region

We kick off this year's study by looking at the price performance of Burgundy compared to four other key fine wine regions: Bordeaux, California, Piedmont, and Tuscany. The price indices shown below comprise the top five wine brands in each respective region.


- The Burgundy index, comprising five DRC cuvées, has stormed ahead of other regions since the beginning of 2016, leading to price gains of 82% over the past six years
- Piedmont comes next with growth of 61% over the period
- Whilst unable to match Burgundy's performance, California and Tuscany have enjoyed decent growth (46% and 42% respectively)



A look at price performance over a shorter period, since November 2016, shows a continuation of the same pattern.

- The Burgundy index slumped in December 2016 – down 5% – but quickly bounced back, gaining 23% over the past 12 months
- However, it is only since August 2017 that the Burgundy index has overtaken the California index, whose strong growth rates have slowed over recent months
- The Bordeaux index again stands out, gaining just 3% over the past year


12-month price performance by region



Average search frequency by region

Here we look at the three-month online average search frequency per region.


- When it comes to online popularity, it is very much a case of Bordeaux and the rest
- Bordeaux's top 50 wines receive around four times more searches each month on average than those from other regions



Popularity growth by region

The scene changes again when we look at the development of online search frequency since November 2015.


- Whilst each region followed a similar trajectory up to December 2016, two regions have since moved away from the pack
- Burgundy and Piedmont the same two regions to experience the strongest price performance have also risen the most in popularity, at 76% and 81% respectively

Average trade at auction by region


Trading volumes once again confirm Bordeaux's current dominance. Here we look at the average number of bottles traded over the last four quarters by the 50 top-scoring wines in each region (for the five top-trading vintages of each).




Average value of trades at auction

When we look into the approximate value of trades at auction, the picture changes significantly.

• The astronomical prices of some of Burgundy's top cuvées mean that in spite of a fraction of the volume going under the hammer, auction revenues from Burgundy's top wines represent well over two-thirds of those from Bordeaux

Average Wine Lister scores by region

Wine Lister ratings comprise three categories: Quality, Brand, and Economics.

This chart plots average overall and category scores for the 50 top-scoring Burgundy wines in this study, and the 50 top-scoring wines in four other fine wine regions.

- Burgundy leads the way, 14 points ahead of Bordeaux, with a bigger gap separating it from the other three regions
- Burgundy is strongest when it comes to Economics, enjoying a lead of over 90 points ahead of its closest rival in the category – Bordeaux
- Burgundy also leads in the Quality category, leading second-placed Piedmont by 43 points
- Burgundy's average Brand score is not currently able to match its exceptional performance in the Quality and Economics categories, trailing leader Bordeaux by 70 points (but beating the other regions)



- price performance / popularity

Price index growth by subset

Here we look at the performance of <u>nine subsets of the 175 wines in this study</u> since November 2012.


- There is a noticeable increase in growth rates for all subsets since early 2016
- The Côte de Beaune white Premiers Crus / Villages have enjoyed the greatest gains, more than doubling in value over five years



Average search frequency by subset

Here we look at the relative online search frequency for the same <u>subsets</u> as above.


- Vosne-Romanée's Grands Crus lead the way in terms of popularity, thanks in no small part to this being the home of Domaine de la Romanée-Conti (DRC)
- In general it is the wines of the Côte de Nuits that enjoy greater consumer demand if online searches are anything to go by, with wines from Morey, Chambolle, and Gevrey coming next in line



Average trade at auction by subset

Trading volumes give us a slightly different insight into the positioning of the different subsets.

• This time it is the commune of Morey-Saint-Denis that comes out top, with Grands Crus such as Clos de la Roche and Clos des Lambrays trading more frequently at auction than those from Vosne




Distribution of prices

Below we look at the distribution of prices for all 175 wines in this study.

- The majority of top Burgundy wines we have looked at are priced between £100 and £500 per bottle (62%)
- 18 wines cost more than £2,000 per bottle

Average Wine Lister scores by vintage

- Here we consider average overall Wine Lister scores and category scores for all <u>175 wines in</u> this study, for vintages since 2008.
- 2010 has the highest overall score thanks to strong economic performance as well as an exceptional quality level
- However, 2012 and 2015 have higher average Quality scores (943 and 938 respectively)
- 2008 and 2011 have the lowest Quality scores of the last eight vintages
- However, 2008 in particular outperforms more recent vintages (post-2010) in terms of economics, with the second-highest Economics score (876), thanks to stronger price growth, both over the last three years and the last six months
- Across all vintages, Quality proves to be Burgundy's strongest category, followed by Economics, with Brand the weakest of the three Wine Lister rating categories for the region

top-scoring Burgundy crus by category

This section of the study delves deeper into the different Burgundy wines analysed through the prism of Wine Lister's ground-breaking rating system.

In this section we present the top scoring Burgundy wines, ranked by overall score, and by each Wine Lister category – Quality, Brand, and Economics. Within each main category we also analyse the component criteria, looking at critics' scores, ageing potential, restaurant presence, online search frequency, price, price performance (long-term and short-term), price stability, and volume traded.

The Wine Lister ratings confirm the dominance of a few revered domaines – one in particular – in perpetuating brand strength and pricing. With Burgundy's current storming economic form, it is in the Economics category that scores are consistently most impressive. Quality scores for the top wines are also at the very top end of the scale. It is only in the Brand category that the top Burgundy labels vary more widely in their scores.



- Wine Lister background / 1000-point scale




- Wine Lister rates wines across three categories: Quality, Brand, and Economics
- Each category consists of several criteria
- Ratings exist for each vintage, and at wine level (a cross-vintage assessment of each wine, with more recent vintages given a higher weighting)
- Quality is given the largest weighting, then Brand, and finally Economics
- Wine Lister scores change frequently, as data is constantly updated

- Data-driven algorithms ensure objectivity
- The transparent and unmanipulable nature of the ratings ensure **impartiality**
- Wine Lister is entirely **independent**: we do not sell, or facilitate the sale of, wine
- Wine Lister's methodology and parameters are based on extensive **research**

the scores from our partner critics, four of the most respected critics in the world – <u>Jancis Robinson</u>, <u>Vinous</u> (Antonio Galloni and Neal Martin), <u>Bettane+Desseauve</u>, and <u>Jeannie Cho</u> <u>Lee</u>. A small weighting is also added for a wine's longevity.





- Scores are out of 1000 to maximise the scale of difference and move away from the inflated use of the traditional 100-point scale
- Wine Lister utilises the entire scale, not just the top 20%
- This scale should be interpreted in the context of fine wines

Restaurant presence

We have scoured the world's top wine lists from Michelin-starred restaurants, 50 Best Restaurants, and World of Fine Wine Best Wine List restaurants, in order to ascertain global prestige and clout for each wine. We measure breadth across establishments as well as depth within each one (number of vintages/bottle formats).

Critics' scores


Our partner critics' tasting scores, combined, are a reliable measure for quality. We take the scores from four of the most respected critics in the world – <u>Jancis Robinson, Vinous, Bettane</u> + <u>Desseauve</u>, and <u>Jeannie Cho</u> <u>Lee</u>, spreading scores across the full scale, and normalising for fair comparison. Each critic is weighted equally.

Wine life

A long drinking window indicates a great wine, so we use longevity in our quality assessment, applying a modest weighting. We take the average length of our partner critics' suggested drinking windows.

Popularity

Measuring the number of searches on the world's most visited wine site, <u>Wine-Searcher</u>, provides a unique insight into a wine's real consumer demand. We look at the rolling-average number of searches for each wine, relative to the average change in searches across all wines.



3 month average price

The market price is the ultimate measure of what people are willing to pay for each wine. We use prices from <u>Wine Owners</u> (based on the world's largest price database, <u>Wine-Searcher</u>), carefully calculated to give realistic market-level prices, excluding sales tax.

6 month price performance

The relative short-term price performance of each wine gives an indication of its current price trend. We calculate the price change over the last six months, and compare this to the average of the Wine Lister basket.

3 year CAGR

Long-term price performance demonstrates whether a wine's price has been sustainable over time. We calculate the CAGR (compound annual growth rate) over the last three years, relative to other wines on Wine Lister.

Price stability

Higher price stability means more consistency, less risk and therefore a better score.


We use historical prices provided by <u>Wine Owners</u> to calculate the price volatility, by looking at the standard deviation of the wine price over the last 12 months, expressed as a proportion of the average price over the same period.

Volume traded

Trading volumes are an important measure of a wine's success in the marketplace. We use figures collated by Wine Market Journal from sales at the world's major auction houses in order to measure the wine's relative trading volume.

- top Wine Lister scores in Burgundy




Here we list the top scoring Burgundy crus as at 4th December 2017. These are the overall Wine Lister scores comprising the three category scores for Quality, Brand, and Economics. They are applied at wine level (an average of the last 30 vintages, with the highest weighting for the most recent vintage, and so on).

- The top 25 is dominated by DRC, which fills the top four spots and a mammoth seven of the top nine
- La Romanée-Conti and La Tâche are inseparable with a score of 989, and are the top two wines on the whole of Wine Lister
- The best of the rest is Armand Rousseau's Chambertin with a score of 970. With two other cuvées in the top 25 – Chambertin Clos de Bèze and Gevrey-Chambertin Clos Saint-Jacques (one of just two Premiers Crus in the top 25) – Rousseau is a force to be reckoned with
- The top 25 is dominated by reds, with only four whites making the table
- Other than DRC Montrachet, Domaine Leflaive produces Burgundy's top two whites – its Chevalier-Montrachet just two points ahead of the Bâtard-Montrachet
- There are just two other producers that feature more than once in the top 25 – Comte Georges de Vogüé (with two cuvées) and Leroy (with four)
- Other producers making the top 25, with a single entry, are Georges Roumier, Clos de Tart, Ponsot, Jacques-Frédéric Mugnier, Comte Liger-Belair, and Dujac










Q3: Which wines do you consider hidden gems (wines you rate highly but which are underappreciated)?


